

Case study on Back Yard Poultry

In a village called Relliguda, there is a farmer , he has three children , They used to depend on agriculture for their livelihood and the crops they grow depend on the rainfall. Under the first crop, paddy is planted in Kharif, and under the second crop, sesame, pesal, and minu are planted. They depend heavily on cashew as a commercial crop. In the current period, they are facing a lot of trouble in getting income even in cashew farming.

In Relliguda village conducted the meeting with shg women's and briefly explained the SABAL project objectives and activities. Those who want to Byp shed were told about the agreement first and signatures were taken in the agreement that chicks should be given to every women in the group and each women will be given to after six months one hen or Cock return back to group.



The farmer, who was interested in raising chickens, did not take a step forward due to the lack of cooperation and remained the same. Farmers were told about the help they are getting for raising chicks through Rain Forest. Due to the farmer's interest, explained about poultry farming and the commitments involved in the project.



The BYP shed is run by women. The community has to raise them and give 5 chicks each to other women, if they don't do that, they do it with whoever is interested in the group and provide them with the help they need. 25000/- rupees from the project was given for chicks. The farmer was constructing a BYP shed, In this manner, after 6 months of giving to chicks, 125 children should be given to 25 women at the rate of 5 chicks per woman. By raising Chicks in this way they are making profit

Chicks are given to the women in the community, along with vegetable plants and chicks are planted around the Byp farm. Until now, 35 chicks were given to 7 women at the rate of 5 chicks.
